### **WORKSHOP OVERVIEW**

In this interactive workshop, we will use written texts, videos, and expert interviews to examine in depth the origin, characteristics, and distinctive theoretical and methodological affordances of the practice-theoretical perspective. The term practice-theoretical perspective refers to a family of approaches in which social practices form the fundamental theoretical category and unit of analysis. During the workshop, we will distinguish between different generations of practice scholars and reflect on the similarities and differences between emerging practice-theoretical perspectives and traditions. We will also examine how adopting a practice-theoretical perspective makes a difference vis a vis cognate approaches and explore some of the practical differences deriving from applying a practice-based sensitivity to a variety of research topics.

## ABOUT THE LECTURER

Davide Nicolini is Professor of Organization Studies at Warwick Business School where he co-directs the IKON Research Centre and co-ordinates the Practice, Process and Institution Research Programme and the KIN network. In the past he has held positions and visiting appointments at the University of Oslo, The Tavistock Institute in London, ESADE in Barcelona, the Universities of Trento and Bergamo in Italy. His current research focuses on the development of the practice-based approach and its application to phenomena such as expertise, managerial knowing and attention, collaboration, safety and technological innovation in organizations. He is also interested in the refinement and promotion of processual, relational and materialist research methods. He has used these approaches to study healthcare organizations, managerial work, construction sites, factories, public organizations, cybersecurity, pharmacies & scientific labs.
